

# Occupation Comparisons

**O**\*Net OnLine is a federally funded National Consortium, funded by the U.S. Department of Labor, that lists occupations and describes various jobs, their duties, the education needed for those positions and then rates those positions. O\*Net is used by the U.S. Department of Labor workforce development. Listed below is a comparison of some positions and jobs posted along with the profession of athletic training. National Athletic Trainers' Association believes all allied health care professionals are a value to the health care system and assist with providing needed health care

services to the citizens of the United States. This comparison was compiled to clearly demonstrate the educational and practical qualifications of athletic trainers.

In this comparison we chart:

**Job Zone** - O\*Net OnLine provides ratings for five Job Zones (job zones are occupations that are similar in experience, education and in quantity of on the job training.)

Job Zone 1 - occupations in this category involve little or no preparation

Job Zone 2 - occupations in this category involve some preparation

Job Zone 3 - occupations in this category involve medium preparation

Job Zone 4 - occupations in this category involve considerable preparation

Job Zone 5 - occupations in this category involve extensive preparation

**Specific Vocational Preparation (SVP)** -SVP is a rating and is usually shown in a range. The low is 1 and the highest rating is 9.
