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Summary Comparison of the 2022 Reducing Intentional Head-first Contact Behavior in American Football Players Position Statement to the 2004 Head Down Contact and Spearing in Tackle Football Position Statement

- Changed the title from Head Down Contact and Spearing in Tackle Football to Reducing Intentional Head-First Contact Behavior in American Football Players
- Expanded the original objective, which was to: "decrease the risk of cervical spine fractures and dislocations in football players." Now: "reducing the prevalence of head-first contact behavior in American football players with the aim of reducing the risk of head and neck injuries"
- Added emphasis on the problem derived from scientific research using headimpact sensor technology, which was not widely available for the original position statement
- Added citations to support recommendations that are assigned a Level of Evidence, with a corresponding Strength of Recommendation Taxonomy (SORT) rating (i.e., A, B or C)
- Retained recommendation categories Rules and Officiating (Regulations) and Education and Coaching (Administration) and removed recommendation category Practices and Concepts
- Added recommendation categories Skill Development and Behavior Modification and Technology and Scientific Research
- Added an overview of the Characteristics of Intervention Studies for Reducing
 Head-Impact Exposure in American Football, with SORT study quality ratings, in
 table format.
